Maths:

We are going to be learning about place value using numbers up to 10 000 000. We will be comparing, ordering and rounding these numbers to the nearest 100, 1000, 10,000 and 100,000.

Other topics that we are going to be learning about this term are:

- Addition, subtraction, multiplication and division written methods and applying these to multistep word problems
- Number types including multiples and factors.
- Fractions

We will continue to develop our arithmetic and recall of number facts and times tables through regular practise.

Religious Education:

In the first half of this term, we are going to be exploring the question – what does it mean to be a Muslin in Britain today? We will be looking at the beliefs of a Muslim and how this impacts their everyday lives. We will also be comparing to other faiths we have learnt about. After half term, we are going to be answering the question – what does it mean if God is holy and loving? We will have the opportunity to explore what the words holy and loving mean and how this is seen in a Christians belief in God. In the run up to Christmas we will also be looking at the question 'Is Jesus the Messiah?' and examining the evidence there is.

Art & Design:

This term we will examine Leonardo Da Vinci's drawn and painted portraits. We will adapt the techniques used by Da Vinci to create our own self portraits. Use dry media to make different marks, lines, patterns and shapes within a drawing. We will use different techniques within our work (e.g. shading and hatching) and developing control, expression, shape, form and detail in our work.

History:

This term we are going to be learning about the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons in Britain. We will explore who the Anglo-Saxons and the Vikings were, when and why they invaded Britain and where they settled. Understand and explain what Viking and Anglo-Saxon art (jewellery, ceramics, sculptures and wall paintings) was made from, showed, and what can be learnt about their lives from them.

Physical Education:

Our P.E. days are: Tuesdays and Wednesday

On these days, we ask that you come to school in your P.E. Kit. This means you can wear:

- Plain black/blue joggers or shorts
- Plain white T-shirt or school polo shirt
- P.E. hoodie or school jumper
- Trainers

Throughout the term, you will be using our outside space to develop many of the key skills in P.E. throughout a variety of different games that are in line with the current restrictions.

Music:

In the first half of this term we will be examining the work of Anna Meredith and Stravinsky's Firebird. In the second half of term we will study Khachaturia's Sabre Dance.

English: Writina:

Over the term we are going to be cover a number of different text types. We are going to begin with exploring myths and legends and work towards writing a class book. We are going to be looking at the features of each text type as well as looking at the difference between the. We will also be exploring the characters and settings of them. In addition to this we are going to be looking at writing instructions and explanation texts as well as Kennings poems.

<u>Reading</u>

We are going to be exploring a number of different texts, such as 'The Arrival', through whole class guided reading sessions. We will also be developing our inference and retrieval skills through reading the class text.

Science: Light and Electricity

This term in Science we are going to be investigating light. We will be looking at light sources, how light travels and how we are able to see objects. We will also be carrying out investigations into shadows and exploring why they are the same shape as the object. Our second topic of this term is Electricity.

PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health & Citizenship Education): Mental Health and Well being We will be learning about physical health and wellbeing in the media. We will learn that messages given on food adverts can be misleading. We will also explore role models and how the media can manipulate images and that these images may not reflect reality.

Writing Journals

We have been really impressed with many children's desire and motivation to continue their writing outside of school. Many have particularly enjoyed being able to write with creativity and freedom, choosing the content and style of writing for themselves. We are delighted if they want to share this writing with us.
